Father Pinto's Corner:

<u>A Humble Dignity</u>. Sometimes it can seem, as it must have seemed at first to the Canaanite woman, that the Lord is ignoring our prayers, especially when we are praying for a special intention. However, our Lord was giving the Canaanite woman the opportunity to deepen her prayer and to express her faith in Christ in a more profound way. And that she did, by professing that "even dogs get the scraps from their master's table." Hers was an obedience born of love for her daughter and her profound faith in Jesus Christ.

This interaction, found in **Matthew 15:21-28**, reveals a relationship between the woman and Christ which I see today in the KDCCW here in our Diocese and Our Lord. That relationship is one of humility. For each of them it is humility born out of love and founded in obedience. For Jesus it was His perfect obedience to His Father. For the woman it was obedience to her faith in Jesus, that He is the Son of God and to her daughter whom she loved.

I am so blessed to be the Spiritual Mentor to the ladies of the KDCCW because you have the same humility as the Canaanite woman. Your faith is strong, and you seek to serve the Lord as His handmaids out of your love for Him. You are willing to humble yourselves before the Lord and to do all that he asks of you. You find and share the virtue of humility as you place yourself last, putting the needs of the local Church first.

Looking down on the woman, Jesus was reminded of His own humble attitude driven by obedience and love, an obedience and love to His Father. Consider that our creator would take on the very nature of His own creation and lower Himself even more than a woman who sees herself lower than a "dog." In both instances, the dignity of God and His creation are brought into the realization that divine dignity is exampled in this simple woman from Canaan: the simple dignity that the women of our KDCCW possess.

It is this simple dignity that allows your Diocesan Council members to be a maternal example of humility and obedience to our Lord and to the Church here in our Diocese. You bring even more than your humility and dignity to our Diocese. You bring your belief and reverence to the Real Presence of the Lord among us today. In your faith, you realize that Jesus is still humbly before us. He is still with us, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, just as He stood before the Canaanite woman. In this respect, you are our maternal mothers of our Diocese here on earth, exampling Mary who is our maternal mother in Heaven.

Dear ladies of the KDCCW, thank you for your dedication to the priests and the Bishop of our Diocese. You are in my prayers that the Lord will continue to bless you with your humble dignity so you may continue to be an example that God does truly hear our prayers and answers them.

GET INVOLVED – LEARN – GROW – SHARE - LEAD **Cameroon Mission Update** Brother Stephen, Principal and Administrator of St. Pius X Schools in Tatum, Cameroon recently shared some good news: "Our students of St. Pius X College (HS) scored 100% in the National Exams G.C.E. Ordinary Level. We are excited and feel fulfilled that our efforts finally vielded fruits. Thank you all very much for your regular prayers and financial support. The KDCCW is indeed part of our success story." This is heartening to read! Many students have received tuition assistance from your continued generosity since KDCCW began this effort in 2008. What an accomplishment for these young people who have been living amid civil unrest for so long. Many parents are unable to work with the political situation in their region. With our support, their children are able to continue with a Catholic education, which helps foster vocations. \$700 was sent in August to assist with the upcoming school year, but that amount remains less than what we have provided in the years before Covid.
